We are now a **Gold Member** of the Green Globe certification, a testimony to our commitment to sustainable development. We recognize that the success of our industry is closely linked to the preservation of each island's natural environment.

Whether you are in the Maldives, Seychelles, Mauritius or Madagascar enjoying the beautiful beaches, at Constance Hotels & Resorts, we care about protecting the ecosystems and keeping them clean, thus creating a healthy ocean with abundant marine life.

SECTION 3

SUSTAINABILITY CERTIFICATIONS & PRACTICES

The Green Globe Certification Programme

CHRG embarked on the Green Globe Certification programme in 2013 to better promote its existing environmental sustainability credentials and to enhance its sustainability performance. 2018 was a turning point as six of our properties located across the Indian Ocean were awarded the prestigious Green Globe Gold Certificate with an average score of 90%.



Exploitation-free Environment

CHRG strictly complies with all applicable labour laws and regulations, and prohibits the employment, sexual harassment and exploitation of children. In this respect, a dedicated set of internal policies, such as the Equal Employment Opportunity Policy and the Code of Conduct for the Protection of Children from Sexual Exploitation in Travel and Tourism, introduced by The Code.org, have been put in place.

The Seychelles Sustainable Tourism Label (SSTL)

Launched in 2011 by the Government of Seychelles and recognised by the Global Sustainable Tourism Council, the SSTL is a voluntary sustainable tourism certification programme specifically designed for use by hotels of all sizes in the Seychelles, the objective being to promote more efficient and sustainable ways of doing business.



Constance Belle Mare Plage First Hotel in Mauritius to Receive the Blue Oasis Certification



Blue oasis certification is led by the Mauritius Standard Bureau which is accredited by the Global sustainable tourism council . It is an integrated approach to sustainable tourism development through comprehensive standards that include all aspects of sustainability: management, social/community, cultural, and environmental with more than 100 criteria's to be fulfilled.

Green Fins Certification

As a Green Fins member, TGI Maldives (Diving Center) strives to protect and conserve the coral reefs at Constance Halaveli, Maldives by establishing and implementing friendly guidelines to promote sustainable diving and snorkeling including the monitoring of the environmental impact of its Diving Center. Regular training sessions are conducted to ensure that the Green Fins Code of Conduct is strictly adhered to.



Padi Certification

CHRG adheres to the PADI principles, thus ensuring that our guests receive the best experience in terms of technical guidance and environmental practices. The Professional Association of Diving Instructors (PADI) is the world's leading scuba diver training organization. It defines itself as a force for good with tremendous human potential to make an impact on critical social and environmental issues. PADI is dedicated to bringing these issues to the forefront and inspiring actions that lead to a stronger global dive community and a healthier ocean planet.



Food Safety Management Systems

Following the introduction of the new version of ISO 22000 in June 2018, Constance Belle Mare Plage became the first hotel in the Indian Ocean to be certified. HACCP practices are in place in other resorts and are regularly audited in conformity with the aforesaid standards. With a view to offering the best culinary experiences, the preferences and allergies of each and every guest are duly considered and appropriate meals are offered when requested.


Responsible Sourcing & Procurement (RSP)

We carry out RSP while giving due consideration to our guests' satisfaction, company standards and also reasonable costing, including: incorporating sustainability criteria in purchasing evaluations, implementing routing mechanisms and assessments to promote compliance along the supply chain, encouraging and favoring eco-friendly and power-efficient products, favoring recycled and biodegradable products, buying seasonal and locally-produced goods as far as possible to limit transport energy, purchasing in bulk to reduce packaging wastes, favouring less harmful fertilizers and cleaning agents, favouring eco-friendly designs and eco-labelled products, preferring sources which are less polluting or which use clean technology, sensitising and favoring vendors that use recycled packaging materials, greening the supply chain by seeking vendors that share our values and have in place an environment management system.



SECTION 4

AN ECO-FRIENDLY BRAND



CHRG is fully engaged in the preservation of biodiversity in the territories where it operates. We thus put in place actions that will reduce harmful impacts on the environment such as favoring organic fertilizers in order to reduce the use of chemical pesticides, using environmentally friendly household products, being more responsible when purchasing food materials, minimizing the use of lights, participating in ecological restoration initiatives in local areas, etc.

Water Sources

Water conservation is becoming essential. In this respect, our continued efforts to reduce water wastage over the past years have enabled us to attain optimal cost savings at Constance Hotels, Resorts & Golf. As a responsible organization, we regularly put in place actions to deal with water shortages, such as reducing water waste by installing regulators, sensitising customers and staff to be responsible consumers, equipping all our properties with a water bottling plant, using a rain water harvesting system to irrigate our Chefs' Gardens with a spinning of wastewater (treated in their water treatment plant), etc. We use 100% recycled wastewater for irrigation purposes. We have in place a linen change policy that encourages guests to use their bed sheets and towels for longer periods if they are not dirty.

Energy Consumption

We strongly believe that the reduction of our energy consumption will lead to a reduction of our environmental footprint, while also lowering energy costs. In order to minimize energy consumption, we strive to reduce it by regulating it, promoting renewable energies and efficient equipment, etc. We have implemented the SCADA system in the engineering department for a better monitoring of energy consumption.

Waste

We recognize that our operations generate an important amount of waste which constitutes a major pollutant, affecting both the environment and public health. In 2020-2021, despite the COVID-19 pandemic and the challenge of managing increased medical waste, we continued to apply the four R's of Waste Management: - **refuse, reduce, reuse and recycle**. So as to limit the impact on the environment by promoting biodegradable raw materials, recycling, safely disposing of non-recyclable and environmentally harmful products, we are in partnership with Parley for the Ocean which helps us to recycle our plastic waste into usable items such as tennis shoes.

In addition, after a review of the sustainability practices and initiatives in place at Constance Belle Mare Plage, the hotel was selected among nine prestigious establishments to participate in

'The Pledge on Food Waste' Certification. This Food Waste Prevention Programme was launched by Business Mauritius under its Sustainability Programme, 'Signe Natir', in collaboration with LightBlue Environmental Consulting Co. Ltd (LEC), the Human Resources Development Council (Mauritius), Living Labs Federation (LLF) and Foodwise Mauritius. After six months of implementation and auditing exercise, the hotel was awarded the certificate and had reduced its food waste per cover by 65% across the food production chain. Constance Lemuria, Seychelles was subsequently selected to participate in the same Food Waste Prevention Programme launched by the Organisation Internationale de la Francophonie (OIF) in collaboration with LEC and LLF, and funded by the Agence Française de Développement.



Emissions

With the aim of minimising our carbon footprint, we have aligned our actions with the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) and the Paris Agreement. We have integrated the Hotel Carbon Measurement Initiative (HCMI) methodology into our monthly reporting process to monitor and reduce our carbon emissions more effectively, while contributing to SDG13 on climate action.

Waste Management & Recycling

By these actions the establishment reduces both its carbon footprint and food waste. Changes have also been made to food servings, including through “a la carte menus” and smaller portions.

External teams and service providers are regularly trained and sensitised to optimize the supply chain.

📍 Seychelles

Eco-practices in Seychelles



At Constance Ephelia, Seychelles, the group uses eco-friendly, energy-efficient products wherever possible. Eco-design and the use of eco-labelled products are also encouraged and facilitated. Bulk buying of supplies is also prioritized to reduce packaging waste.



Local food, entertainment and culture are valued and promoted right across the Constance Hotel & Resorts group to offer guests locally-produced and environmentally-friendly souvenirs of their stay.

Constance Lemuria

→ At the Constance Lemuria, the group has initiated a Turtle Management Program under the guidance of two experts - Dr. Jeanne Mortimer (Seychelles-based scientist and marine turtle conservation expert) and Robert Matombé (the Turtle Manager) with the aim of protecting the local turtle population.

Constance Ephelia

→ We do the utmost to refuse, reduce, recycle and reuse so as to decrease our impact on the environment. In order to achieve this end, we strive to improve the communication of sustainability practices through more awareness campaigns and activities and are opening a mangrove boardwalk to highlight our restoration efforts.

📍 Madagascar

Eco-practices in Madagascar



Discreetly positioned in the environment, the hotel villas are all made from local raw materials, with wooden structures and thatched roofs. They blend in with the lush surroundings, exemplifying responsible tourism, while minimizing water expenditure.



There is no swimming pool, but guests can learn to dive on the reefs in places of untouched beauty, go out to sea with local fishermen or even have a massage on the rocks. Constance Tsarabanjina is also committed to integrating the local population into the life of the hotel.

Wildlife & Ecosystem Surrounding the Hotel

→ Regarding ecology, as from November we shall be using a generator that is powered by gasoline and solar energy (it previously used only gasoline). We buy sustainably harvested seafood and agricultural products while seafood and fish come from the fishermen of Mitsio (the fishermen's island opposite Tsarabanjina), and Ambilobe (one hour away by boat on the mainland).

Eco-practices in Mauritius




With its rich tropical biodiversity, extensive forest of native mangroves and “barachois” or protected fish sanctuary, the Constance Prince Maurice is surrounded by a diversity of wildlife and plant species found nowhere else on the island of Mauritius. To encourage residents to explore this lush natural environment, the hotel has designed and produced the Constance Prince Maurice Coastal and Lagoon Directory in collaboration with the NGO Reef Conservation. Available free of charge to guests, this concise guide is a valuable introduction to the wildlife and plants to be seen around the Constance Prince Maurice.

Constance Prince Maurice

→ **Adopt a Dodo** - This concept has been created to support and promote environmental and social causes through our legendary bird: the dodo. Through this praiseworthy initiative, Constance Prince Maurice aims to help children in need, and at the same time bring a smile to their faces.

Constance Belle Mare Plage

→ With the aim of minimising food waste Constance Belle Mare Plage participates in the Pledge on Food Waste certification program. Recognized throughout the world, this system will allow the hotel establishment to improve its waste monitoring system while developing a scientific approach to preventing waste.

SECTION 6

PRESENTATION OF ECO-TOURISM ACTIVITIES



While the well-being of our guests remains our primary concern, we are committed to balancing our economic priorities with our responsibility to preserve our natural surroundings wherever we operate and to reduce our environmental footprint.

The natural environment is one of the primary attractions for leisure visitors, and in order to develop sustainable tourism, we aim to slow down climate change by taking action to combat it (promoting natural and cultural values, promoting local products, and interacting with local people at cultural events.) In delivering this commitment, we endeavor to respect applicable environmental practices, legalizations and standards, value and preserve the natural and cultural heritage that surrounds us, promote the efficient use of materials and resources in our properties, work diligently to minimize our waste stream by reusing, recycling and conserving natural resources,

particularly through energy and water conservation, set strong environmental and social goals and objectives, integrate a review process, and publish regular progress reports.

We also aim to constantly seek opportunities to improve our environmental management system, involve our guests, team members, suppliers, subcontractors and the local community in our efforts to preserve the environment and consider their opinions and comments when establishing our environmental programs and procedures.



Protection of Endemic Animal and Plant Species

We regularly consult the International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN), the global authority on the status of the natural world and the measures needed to safeguard it. On the basis of information gathered from the IUCN and with the help of professionals in the field, we have identified more than 80 endemic species in the surroundings of our properties and have adapted our landscaping plans and nurseries to protect them from invasive species, thus contributing to the genetic diversity of our destinations.

Mangrove Preservation Program


Wetlands play a significant role in stabilizing greenhouse gas emissions and blunting the impact of climate change. They also buffer coastlines against extreme weather events such as floods and droughts. Apart from being the most effective carbon sinks on earth, wetlands are also biodiversity hotspots and contribute to socio-economic progress as they act as nurseries that protect fish stocks and also create opportunities for ecotourism activities such as kayaking or guided tours.

Given the site locations of Constance Prince Maurice, Mauritius and Constance Ephelia, Seychelles, we aim to improve the management of biodiversity at both properties by enhancing our collaboration with community partners.

Community-based mangrove management plans have been established and successfully implemented over the past seven years at the RAMSAR site with more than 3,000 trees planted and monitored at Port Launay, Seychelles.

Guests and community members are regularly invited for a tour of the mangrove nursery to learn about their contribution to the global ecosystem and the scientific

approach adopted for the transplanting of samples. As part of our Mangrove Management Plan at Constance Ephelia, Seychelles, all projects are implemented in collaboration with the Port Glaud Environment Club (a local sustainability NGO), the Ministry of Environment, Energy and Climate Change, and funded by either the UNDP Global Environmental Finance or Mangroves for the Future.

World Bee Day

Conscious of the urgent need to protect biodiversity, World Bee Day was first celebrated at Constance Prince Maurice with seven hives in 2019. The number of hives has now been increased and they form an integral part of the Chef's Garden which allows the bees to thrive in this exceptional place and produce an equally exceptional honey under the expert monitoring of Etienne de Senneville.




Home-produced Honey

We have our own beehives in our gardens and home-produced honey is served to guests at Constance Prince Maurice only.

Constance Maldives Corals & Island

Along with Reefscapers, the leading company in coral preservation in the Maldives, our marine biologist at Constance Moofushi monitors the recovery of the coral reefs in three sites around the island. With our guests as sponsors, this project not only helps to restore the endangered coral reef ecosystems but also to develop local trade activities as the iron frames on which the corals are fixed are built by locals on the Fulhadhoo Island and shipped by the resort's supply boat whenever needed. Lagoon cleaning is also a regular activity at Constance Moofushi, Maldives, and Constance Halaveli, Maldives, to remove the debris brought by ocean currents and help the marine ecosystem regenerate itself.



Landscape – Hotel Nursery

We give a helping hand to nature by encouraging the planting of endemic trees in our gardens -We minimize the use of hazardous substances, prioritising the use of natural products.



Turtle Day Celebration

Rescue training was provided to team members in May.

All those who attended training will receive a small badge. The badges will be visible to guests, as the team members proudly wear them.



Shark Awareness Day

Together with our Partners, BlueTribe – we have regular sessions of Nice Shark and Whale Shark Days.



Constance Halaveli

The Nature Guide Tour concept has been changed to the “True By Nature Journey”. The kids’ club promotes biodiversity and sustainability practices and a Green News Magazine is published to raise awareness and promote the resort’s sustainability efforts. It is also shown on an inhouse TV channel in guest villas. The magazine announces annual environmental events including World Environment Day, Earth Hour and World Oceans Day when fun activities such as sand sculpting, lagoon cleaning and gardening are organized.



Manta Day

Fun beach activities such as giant sand-castle building and sculpting huge manta ray designs involving both team and guests.

Turtle Talk

Grande Anse Kerlan at Constance Lemuria Seychelles remains the number one beach on Praslin Island with a proper Turtle Conservation Programme led by Mr Robert Matombe who receives guidance from the renowned scientist, Dr. Jeanne Mortimer. The eco-kiosk remains open during the day and guests can feel free to visit and learn about the flora and fauna of the Seychelles. The hotel is aware of the importance of protecting the coastal vegetation to maximise the number of turtles nesting on our beaches.



Kids' Activities

At Constance Lemuria, children can enjoy a free visit to the Vallee de Mai, where they do recycling and planting activities, have learning sessions at the botanical garden, feed the tortoises, etc. They may have the chance to participate in the baby turtles' release with Robert our Turtles Manager depending on the time of year.
